Two New Directors Are Needed ...

he Board of Directors of the Woodstream Home Owners Association (WHOA) consists of three members. The Board conducts and authorizes the business of the Association. Per our By-Laws, the Directors serve one-year terms and are to be elected at the annual members' meeting held each fall. Chuck Grabner and Dan Kalmanir have notified the Board that they will not serve on the Board beyond their current term. As with any organization, rotating the Board members stimulates the vitality of the group.

Directors meet periodically to ensure the business of the WHOA is effectively carried out and to determine if any additional actions are needed. The Board also maintains oversight of all WHOA committees. Board meetings are held at the discretion of the Directors. Usually, the Board meets in person more-or-less quarterly. Special situations can require impromptu meetings. Most issues and discussions are conducted via e-mail, so Board business is not a burden on anyone's busy schedule.

Replacement Mailboxes

oodstream restrictions require all of us to use similar mailboxes. We've learned that the Bronze-colored mailbox previously used by the builders is no longer available. Several very similar mailboxes are available at both Home Depot and Lowes: Home Depot: The Arlington Bronze, T2 size,

Mgr# AR15T000, costs \$75.00, or

<u>Home Depot</u>: Solar Group's "Madison", Bronze, Mfr # MAD015BZ, costs \$34.94

(probably not as durable), or

Lowes: The Estate series in Bronze, costs \$62.98.

Post covers for 4x4's are also available, but no one has a post just like our current posts. Try to be as close as possible.

As all mailboxes need repainting at some point, we suggest Rust-Oleum's brand hammered paint, available in a spray can #210880 Brown. It's available anywhere paints are sold. All mail boxes should be in this color.

Where's My Dues Notice ????

ues are usually due in August. So, why did we not get a bill yet? The operation of WHOA was turned over to the homeowners by the builders in May of 2006. The Board began collecting dues in the summer of that year. In an effort to maintain the "fiscal year", the Directors set it from July to June. Thus, dues were to be collected every summer.

However, we discovered that our true Fiscal Year was set in the Articles of Incorporation to be January through December. To get "back on schedule", the Directors extended this current payment year to 18 months. Henceforth, dues will be due in January, at the beginning of our actual Fiscal Year. As a result, we're all getting a 6-month pass on paying our dues.

We are able to ride out this year with our existing account balance, thanks to our builders paying many of the bills in 2006 and 2007. Had the initial Board held to the actual Fiscal Year, we would've already paid three years of dues (2006, 2007, and 2008). So, we've really saved a year's worth of dues. 2009 dues notices will go out in December for payment in January.

Osage Orange Trees

ver wonder about that messy tree on Busey
Road across from our Woodstream entrance? It
is an Osage Orange tree.

It has played an important part in American history. The Osage Indians knew the value of its strong wood and used it to make bows, and tomahawk handles. It was so valuable that Indian tribes from other regions would trade for the strong wood ... the price being a horse and a blanket.

Pioneers used its strength and thorns to create formidable hedge rows. Giving it the nickname "hedge apple". A single row of hedge trees planted a foot apart would yield a fence that was "horse high, bull-strong, and hog-tight". It was also used for wagon wheels and cattle yokes. In WWI, the army used the green fruits to dye uniforms a lovely olive drab color. But in 1874, Osage Orange met its match. A new invention, barbed wire, was now cheaper to use for fencing.

The interesting green fruits of the tree have uses even today. Some believe that if placed in the corners of your basement or garage, insects like spiders, cockroaches, and crickets will be kept at bay. I have tried it and it seems to work. It's cheaper and less toxic than sprays anyway. One method that definitely works is to pick up the hedge apple and smash the offending bug with it.

Hopefully, you now have a new appreciation for the gnarly tree that marks our entrance. So, stop and pick up some green "alien brains" and scare all the creepy crawlies from your basement.
